I am a product of the 37th Legislative District, having attending elementary and secondary schools on Beacon Hill and in the Rainier Valley. When I was young, I qualified to participate in a federal anti-poverty program under CETA and was assigned to work at CAMP under the supervision of a young Larry Gossett. As a high school student, I was recruited to participate in the Coalition for Quality Integrated Education, a community action group which aimed to develop a locally driven alternative to a federally drawn map to desegregate the Seattle Public Schools. Both of these experiences helped to shape my worldview and my core values.

Upon graduation from high school, I attended The Evergreen State College on scholarships but could not afford to continue into my second year. I started my career in the banking industry and, eventually, went back to Evergreen while continuing to work part-time at the bank. After completing my undergraduate degree, I was accepted to attend Northeastern University on a full two-year scholarship.

I have worked in the non-profit sector as an executive director for a global peace and justice think tank and as a fundraiser for a public development authority in the Seattle Chinatown International District. I also worked for the King County Executive as an executive policy analyst specializing in women- and minority-business contracting, hiring agency directors, and community relations.

I have not worked in a position that was represented by a labor union but I have been affiliated with dozens of community-based organizations throughout the past thirty plus years, from Asian Counseling and Referral Service to the King County Women's Political Caucus to the YMCA Youth and Government program.

As noted previously, my early involvement in political activism related to public education and, specifically, to community-based efforts to develop a local alternative to a federally-designed plan to desegregate Seattle Public Schools. As a youngster, I also walked picket lines with my mother to protest inadequate funding for education, actions that eventually led to the historic Dorn decisions.

As a young adult, I worked for a variety of political campaigns for local and federal candidates as well as for issues such as housing, affirmative action, and schools. This increased my participation with organizations such as the Washington State Democratic Party, in which I served on the Chair's Advisory Committee (1994), and the Women's Political Caucus, in which I served as Chair during the so-called Year of the Woman (1992).

During the past twenty-four years, I have served as a State Representative in the 37th Legislative District and have faithfully participated in my District Democratic organization. In my official capacity, I serve as Chair of the House Education Committee and as a member of the standing committees on the Capital Budget and on Consumer Protection and Business. I am currently an appointee to the state Educational Opportunity Gap Oversight and Accountability Committee, the Legislative Oral History Committee, and the Public Stadium Authority Advisory Committee.

Q39

Many individuals in WA have limited access to healthcare. What steps should the legislature take to ensure that all WA residents have meaningful and equitable access to the care and prescriptions they need for their health?

I support comprehensive universal healthcare for Washington state and its residents. Short of this, I support continued efforts to expand Apple Health for underserved populations such as people with mental and behavioral health issues as well as efforts to partner with the federal government to institute and/or expand federal programs modeled after Medicare to serve non-elderly patients. Finally, I think we can and should continue to work with PBMs and with pharmaceutical companies to lower the cost of common prescription drugs.

Even with recent policies like the Clean Fuels Standard, we know that WA state is significantly behind on hitting its carbon pollution goals for 2035. What climate action and environmental justice policies must the WA legislature adopt in order to actually make progress against these goals and address the climate crisis with the urgency needed?

Washington state passed a transformative transportation budget that leads the way in exemplifying how government agencies should be making spending decisions to facilitate carbon reduction. We should be adopting similar policies for all state and local agencies. We also need to pause and re-examine how our efforts in one policy arena actually contribute to greater environmental and socioeconomic inequities, especially for communities of color. As an example, increased housing density in urban centers such as Seattle encourage the creation of concrete canyons which trap pollution and result in poorer health outcomes for poor urban residents. Climate change and gentrification equally important issues that must be balanced in our policy agenda.

What steps would you take to rebalance our tax code? Please explain the current system vs. your proposal as you would to an average voter.

As a former member of the House Finance Committee, I have long advocated for a graduated income tax for individuals and for businesses, including corporations. I also believe that the best general approach to taxation is to allow for many sources at low rates. I would propose as a single amendment to the constitution to provide for the general welfare of the state that Washington institute a graduated income tax AND fix (limit) the rate of the state sales tax AS WELL AS the state property tax. This would assure the voters that state elected officials may not easily raise core taxes without a vote of the People. At the same time, the state should enact a Homestead Exemption to stabilize housing affordability and stability. Finally, an most importantly, tax exemptions must be treated like expenditures from the state budget in order to increase the transparency of how much these tax breaks cost our state and what value our state receives as a result.

As Democrats, we strive to create a more just and equitable world for all, especially including those communities that have been historically marginalized. How will you center equity in the process of developing legislation, particularly that which impacts individuals unlike yourself?

As a Representative of the most diverse district in the State of Washington and as a person of color, my worldview and policy outlook is unavoidably centered on remediating the negative impacts experienced by historically marginalized groups and on restoring equitable opportunities for them. In truth, I could use a great deal more assistance in these efforts from others, including Democrats.

In your view, what legislative change(s) would be the MOST impactful at reducing housing instability and improving affordability while avoiding gentrification in both your legislative district and across the state?

My District has had the dubious distinction of having some of the most gentrified neighborhoods in the United States. This has displaced, dispossessed, and destroyed many culturally significant community-based institutions in the Central District, the Pioneer Square, and the International District. I believe that two of the most important changes we can make to alleviate housing instability and counteracting the forces of gentrification is to: 1) amend the Growth Management Act in such as way as to protect culturally significant communities through requiring their approval of major projects, especially public projects; and, 2) restore the original intent of the Washington State Land Trust to discourage public entities from contributing to rising prices through real estate speculation and requiring these entities to transfer property to the Trust or a portion of the sales price on surplus public lands to the Housing Trust Fund. Properties transferred to the Land Trust would be used to support the development of affordable housing through long-term lease arrangements to non-profit and public developers.
