I come from a family devoted to public service: my father earned a ROTC scholarship to OSU and served in the Navy, my mother was an elementary school teacher before and after raising kids, both my brother and sister are middle school teachers, and my husband is a retired rescue helicopter pilot.

After graduating from Whitman College and Columbia Law School, I served as a law clerk to federal judge William L. Dwyer, a deputy prosecuting attorney handling criminal matters in King County and Clallam County, and, occasionally, as a protem judge. In addition, I was an associate at Perkins Coie and, most recently, a partner at Harrigan Leyh handling complex civil disputes at trial and on appeal. I am particularly proud of my representation of the Upper Skagit Indian Tribe, including the successful defense of its sovereignty at the U.S. Supreme Court (138 S. Ct. 1649) and of its treaty-reserved fishing rights.

In December 2021, Governor Inslee appointed me as a superior court judge saying, "Kristin brings an incredible breadth of experience. She has years of civil and criminal law experience, including substantial trial experience. She will be an outstanding addition to the King County bench."

Please describe your legal background and experience? What pro bono work have you done in the last 5 years? (please list)

My legal background is stated in answer to question no. 21.

My volunteer / pro bono activities include the following.

I have participated in a number of programs to increase the pipeline of persons in the legal field, including the Tri-Cities Youth & Justice Forum (of which I am on the planning committee) and mock trial.

For the past 20 years, I have been a member of the oversight board of Camp Huston, a camp and conference center in the foothills of the Cascades where I was a camper and counselor growing up. We are an active board, and I serve as the legal advisor to the director.

Since 2013, I have served as a volunteer official with various competitive swim programs. In recent years, this has required approximately 120 hours of service each year as I have taken on increased responsibilities, including training new officials, managing the officiating of meets, and my recent acceptance into USA Swimming's referee training program.

For many years, I have been a member of a number of court rules committees for federal and state courts at the local and the state-wide level.

What do you believe are the most important qualifications and qualities for justices and judges? What is your experience serving as a judge/justice, pro tem, or within the judicial system and how will this inform your perspective on the bench?

As a prosecutor appearing every day before a wide variety of judges, the qualities I most appreciated were integrity, kindness, and a strong intellect. With such a high volume of cases, this combination meant that defendants, their lawyers, and the prosecuting attorneys could make decisions based on a measured, impartial, and principled response from the bench uninfluenced by improper forces (integrity); that defendants, victims, and witnesses would be treated well on what could be the saddest day of their lives (kindness); and that the judge would make decisions grounded in the law (intellect). Throughout my career, I continued to believe those qualities to be most important, and ones from which other important qualities follow, including empathy, courage, industry, and strong research and writing skills.

It was a complete pleasure to serve as a pro tem judge and commissioner, and I am delighted to now serve as a King County Superior Court judge. Each day, many of the litigants are appearing in court for the first time, alone, on the worst day of their lives. My prior judicial experience reinforced my commitment to be kind, empathetic, fair, and un-swayed by outside influences in applying the law.

How would you further equity and access to justice for all in the legal system? Provide specific examples of what you have done or commit to doing to further this goal.

There are at least five barriers to access to justice: financial, language, implicit bias, physical, and cognitive. Each of these can be addressed in part by improving our rules and our communication of court policies and procedures. I have served on many rules committees, with the intent to improve the rules to make accessing justice easier, less confusing, and less expensive. I currently am assigned to dependency cases (cases concerning foster children), and am proposing an overhaul of the rules governing practice in dependency cases with this in mind. In addition, access to justice by marginalized communities can be improved by increasing the pipeline of people from marginalized communities into the legal community. To that end, I have joined the team planning the annual Tri-Cities Youth & Justice Forum and volunteer on various mock trial / moot court programs.

I have fostered open communication between my bailiff (see https://www.linkedin.com/in/cassie-fontenot-7358741bb/) and me. She is in court with me every day. She and I talk every day about what happened in court and how I can improve. She is making me a better judge, and I am grateful for her counsel.

I am committed to learning from and bringing elements of restorative justice to my courtroom. The promise of restorative justice programs is to give harmed persons, the perpetrators of harm, and the community a voice in determining what repair of harm looks like.

Impressive work already has been done to create therapeutic courts, including Drug Diversion Court, the DREAM program, Mental Health Court, and Veterans Court. Those examples have proven that with creativity and compassion we can reduce suffering in our community. It is my privilege to be assigned now to the child welfare rotation within my Court, the purpose of which is to protect children and to attempt to facilitate healing within families. Our therapeutic court, Family Treatment Court, is particularly suited to this task.
